History of Titles

- Titles are a way of logically organizing U.S. Code.
- History:
 - Until the **early 1900s** U.S. Statutes were disorganized
 - Held in many volumes of the “Statutes at Large.”
 - In **1926 Congress** created “**U.S. Code of Congress.**”
 - Main edition **every six years** supplements annually.
 - The Code is divided into **53 Titles.**
 - Deals with broad, logically organized areas of legislation.
 - A complex statute may have provisions that fall into many areas of the Code.
 - **3 new additional Titles** are proposed.

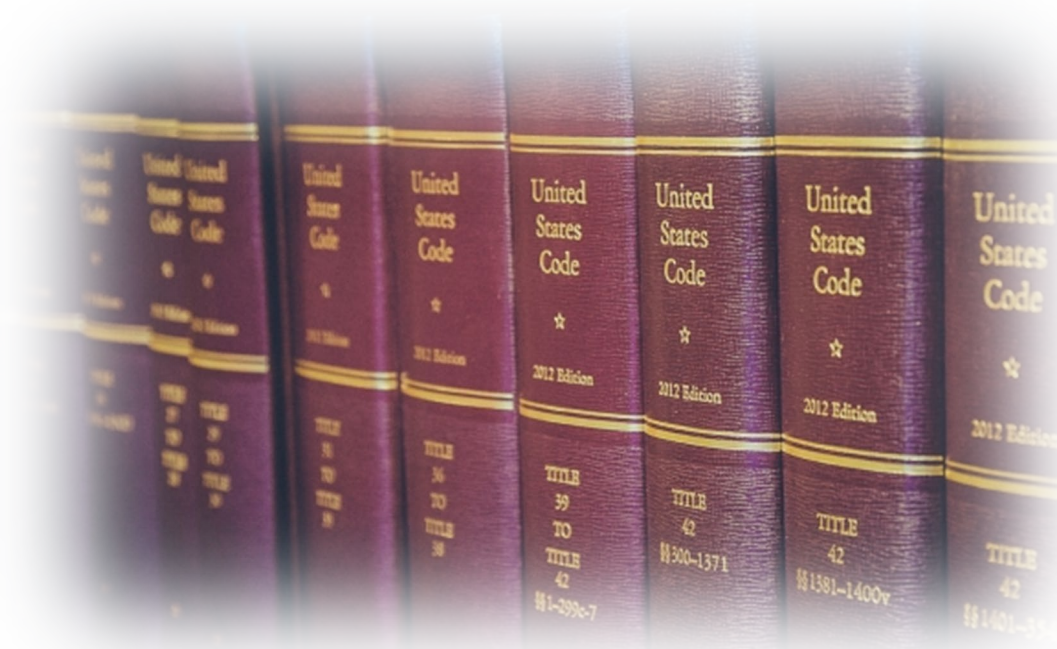

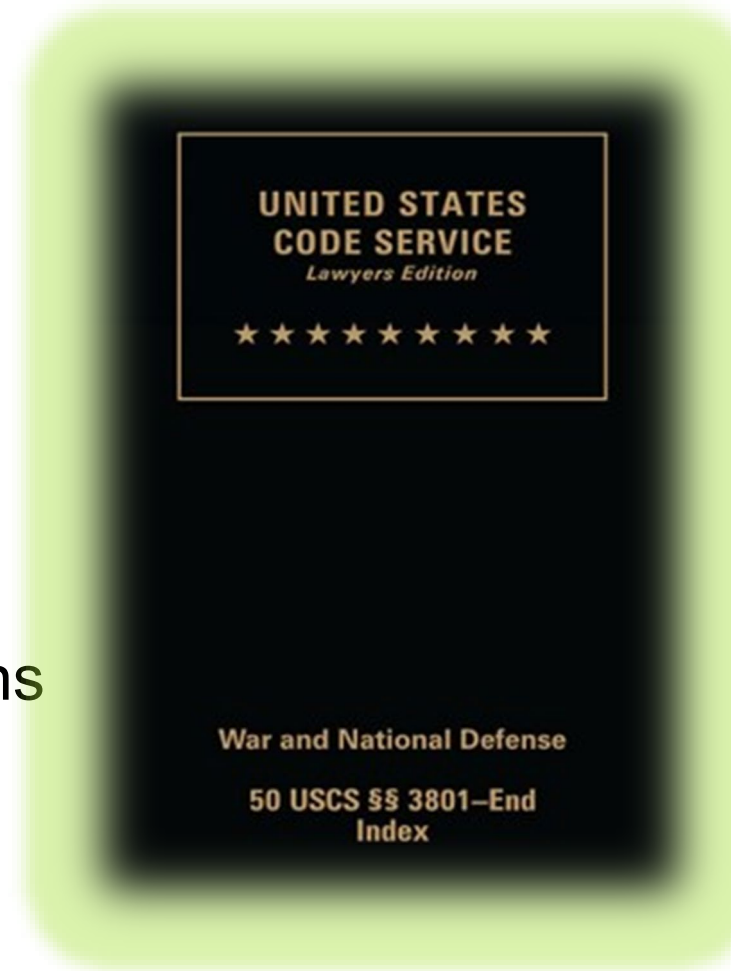

Take Aways

- Titles are “Authorities” set by Statute/US Code
- Titles define Roles/Missions of USG Organizations
- US Code/Titles contain “Acts of Congress”
 - Public Law

 - Statutes considered temporary (NDAA as example)
